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UNIQUE PARTNERSHIP BOLSTERS MEDICAL SERVICES

KEESLER AIR FORCE BASE, Miss. -- Keesler Medical Center and Memorial Hospital at Gulfport have joined in a unique partnership offering several medical subspecialties to Mississippi Gulf Coast residents for the first time.

The Keesler facility and Memorial Hospital signed a training affiliation agreement in April 2009 for subspecialists in pediatrics and obstetrics and gynecology to provide care for military and civilian patients on the Coast in association with Memorial Hospital and its surrounding clinics.

The agreement expands the population base for these particular subspecialists, helping the physicians increase proficiency in the latest medical skills and techniques, as well as, providing a platform for the return of pediatric and OB/GYN residencies to the Keesler facility.

Commenting on the partnership, Brig. Gen. (Dr.) Dan Wyman, 81st Medical Group commander, said, "The Keesler Medical Center physicians will provide the only care in these particular subspecialties on the Mississippi Gulf Coast, expanding the capability and capacity for pediatric and OB/GYN medical care within our community."

The pediatric subspecialists include:

Maj. (Dr.) Jessica Cowden, pediatric infectious disease, provides inpatient and outpatient consultation for children with suspected or proven infection, chronic or recurrent infections, fever of unknown origin, exposure to infectious diseases and travel medicine.

Lt. Col. (Dr.) Stephen Nelson, pediatric neurologist, currently provides inpatient and outpatient consultation for children with suspected or proven neurological disorders, including seizures, headaches, developmental delay and movement disorders.

Maj. (Dr.) Matt Goldman, pediatric gastroenterologist, provides inpatient and outpatient consultation for children with suspected or proven gastrointestinal diseases including inflammatory bowel disease, constipation and abdominal pain syndromes.

Lt. Col. (Dr.) Thomas Newton, pediatric hematologist/oncologist, provides an outpatient clinic with full infusion and transfusion services and inpatient care for children with cancer, sickle cell

Long time coming: Korean War vets receive high school diplomas

It was a long time coming for Pecatonica, IL resident Walter Gipe and Winnebago, IL resident George Bell. The two men who attended Polo, Illinois High School up until entering the service, have always felt they earned a diploma – but until the Polo Centennial School Veteran's Day Ceremony, neither had one.

Gipe, who would have graduated with the class of

1950, learned late last August he would be getting the diploma after the Polo School Board approved it. He then called fellow Korean War Veteran, George Bell, an old friend who happened to be in the same boat and would have graduated in 1949, and told him the news.

The two men have similar stories – both leaving Polo High School to join the Army. Gipe entered the Army Aug. 2, 1948. He was 17 and went into the

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Army with two other friends. Bell had two older brothers in the Army, and entered as well to serve his country with others at PHS.

"It was a big deal then," Bell said. "We would talk often about joining the service."

Gipe had to get out of the Army shortly after learning his father was ill. When he came back, he tried going back to school but needed to keep working for his family and schedules never worked out. At 19, instead of graduating with his class, Gipe went back in the service – this time the Navy in 1950 at age 19 when the Korean War broke out. He was there for four years, discharged Nov. 11, 1954.

During the war, Gipe served as a machinist. He had considered the Air Force, but they didn't have a need for a steam machinist and Gipe enjoyed the job. Bell went into the Field Artillery Unit for five months and says he was fortunate enough to be chosen to go into a military government team just outside Tokyo and became a health inspector,

inspecting meat markets. He was there for about a year before the Korean War broke out and he was sent back to his artillery unit.

"Being that young and that far away from home – things were as good as you could expect," Bell said.

Bell was in the front lines right away, he said, and was there less than a month before he was shot. That, along with other health issues, made things hard there, but Bell said nine months in the hospital wasn't as bad as being captured. When he finally healed, Bell was sent to a base Post Office near Tokyo and was there on limited service before heading home in October of 1951.

Life without a diploma

Back at home, Gipe began working second shift at a factory in Oregon. He said he had never considered going back to school after getting married right away and finding work. He held many jobs over the years and says he doesn't remember having trouble getting a job even without a diploma.

"The only thing I didn't have was a

piece of paper," Gipe said, noting he had plenty of training and knowledge for all of the jobs he held.

Bell, too, said jobs came easy after his time in the service. He held many jobs in computer sciences after taking a couple of classes at the Rockford School of Business. He also served as a bookkeeper. Bell worked as a letter carrier in Rockford for about five years before he learned of the postmaster job opening in Winnebago. He took the test, passed and got the job, retiring from the Post Office in January of 1991 and Gipe was shortly behind, retiring from his work in 1992.

For many years, Gipe has attended his class reunions with the Polo High School class – they've always included him and he's attended. In fact, it was at a class reunion where fellow classmate, Betty Obendorf, kept asking about him getting his diploma. Soon, many classmates were involved and finally, the school board voted to give both Gipe and Bell what they felt had been earned long ago. Gipe's wife, Mary Jean, who graduated from Polo in 1953, says her classmates wanted to help Walt, too.

Gipe said State Representative Jim Sacia and Pecatonica High School Principal Tom Hoffman and Supt. Bill Faller, who had previously worked in Polo, were both instrumental in helping him get the diploma as well.

"It's amazing what a person can do if you know the right people," Gipe said.

Bell says he's attended a few class reunions over the years, but has felt somewhat out of place at times.

The diplomas were awarded during the Veteran's Day ceremony in Polo, which is a popular and moving day

for many in the area. Gipe said he wouldn't have cared how the diploma was given, and appreciated the ceremony that was filled with his family and friends, including his four sons: Gerald (Cheryl), Donald (Kim), Thomas (Pat) and Timothy (Dina). The group went to the Pinecricker Café in Polo after to celebrate the accomplishment of the two men.

"They could have mailed (the diploma) to me," Gipe said. "At 78, I didn't want to take anything away from a graduating class – they work hard, too."

Gipe said he didn't speak at the ceremony because he was caught off guard but is grateful to everyone who helped him get the diploma he's been waiting for.

Walt Gipe says getting his diploma has been something he's wanted all of his life. "It's a lifetime dream," Gipe said. "It's something you want more than anything else."

Walt and Mary Jean Gipe have been married 55 years and have 11 grandchildren and 12 great-grandchildren. Walt says he was proud his grandchildren were able to see their grandfather receive his diploma.

For Bell, the diploma is something to be proud of as well. "It's a relief," he said. "I don't need it – but it bothers you. I feel much better even though I can't do anything with it."

George and Marlene Bell have been married for 58 years and have five children: Geolene (Steve) Spiker, Jeffrey (LaVonne), Julie (Pat) Eytalis, James (Judy) Bell and John Bell. They have seven grandchildren and 11 great-grandchildren.

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ANGLICO Marines ensure Estonian success in NATO effort

PATROL BASE MASOOD, Helmand province, Islamic Republic of Afghanistan — "It was well planned," said Estonian 1st Lt. Alar Karileet, following an insurgent attack near Patrol Base Masood in late October. "The Taliban were in three positions of four to five men each."

Taliban insurgents fired on the Estonian patrol of soldiers with Company C, Expeditionary Estonian Task Force, in an open field less than a half mile from the patrol base.

Marine Capt. Ryan Petersen, an artillery officer and Joint Terminal Attack Controller with 2nd Brigade Platoon, 2nd Air Naval Gunfire Liaison

Company, Marine Expeditionary Brigade-Afghanistan, sat in the Estonian Combat Operations Center at Masood as the firefight took place, receiving coordinates where enemy fighters were located. Shortly after, one high explosive artillery round landed on the insurgent position.

"The rounds were effective and suppressed the Taliban attack," said Petersen, of Mishawaka, Ind.

A second firefight broke out less than 10 minutes later from a different enemy position as the Estonian patrol moved to assess the damage caused by the artillery round. Petersen, still in the COC, performed the same actions. A second artillery round, the same kind as before, landed on the second position.

"Artillery we asked for made a direct hit on one position, and no one shot at us from there again," Karileet said.

There was never a time, in more than two months of combat operations, where Estonian soldiers left the protective wire of Patrol Base Masood or Patrol Base Shamshad, located less than four kilometers away from each other, without the presence of a force multiplier. That force multiplier came in the form of five Marines from 2nd ANGLICO, MEB-Afghanistan.

The team of Marines, led by Petersen, gave the Estonian soldiers the ability to fully integrate themselves into Marine battle spaces in the Helmand River Valley. The Marines provided the liaison capability with nearby 2nd

Battalion, 8th Marine Regiment, as well as the ability to call for indirect fire and aircraft support in the forms of fire missions, over watch and surveillance.

Estonia, which is located along the Baltic Sea in Northern Europe, is one of NATO's newest and smallest members. Estonian soldiers spent the past couple months working to maintain security in Masood and Shamshad. October's firefight was the first in the Masood District in many weeks.

"[The Estonians] are good infantrymen," said Maj. Matthew Maz, platoon commander, 2nd Brigade Platoon, 2nd ANGLICO. "We provide the necessary enablers to allow them to do what they are good at."

Doctor able to help on flights on three different occasions

KEESLER AFB, Miss. — "Is there a doctor on board?!" This is a plea an 81st Medical Group surgeon has responded to on three occasions while traveling aboard passenger aircraft.

Maj. (Dr.) Yekaterina Karpitskaya's most recent in-flight emergency occurred Sept. 28. The major, an orthopedic surgeon with the 81st Surgical Operations Squadron, was on an international flight from Memphis to Amsterdam en route to Budapest, Hungary, to run the Spar

International Budapest Marathon.

"There was an overhead announcement requesting medical personnel to report to where a 59-year-old woman was complaining of chest pain," she said. "She was from Pensacola, flying with her husband on their way to Italy for a vacation. The flight crew put us in first class where she could lie down and I had space. I placed an oxygen mask on her face and carefully monitored her vital signs. She was not getting better. I attempted an EKG (electrocardiogram) using onboard equipment, but it was outdated and not functioning properly.

At that point I gave her aspirin and nitroglycerin (from the aircraft's emergency kit) and advised the captain that we had a patient with atypical chest pain and a possible cardiac event in progress. Diversion was arranged so the patient could be transferred to a local medical center."

The flight ended up landing at John F.

Kennedy International Airport in New York City, where emergency medical technicians took over.

Major Karpitskaya said the woman's husband later contacted her and let her know his wife was fine.

Her first mid-air medical assistance call occurred in April 2007 when she was returning to Los Angeles after running her second Boston Marathon. A diabetic woman experienced weakness and a headache during flight. The other incident happened in May 2008 during a flight to Al Udeid Air Base, Qatar, with a passenger with severe abdominal pain. Both cases ended on positive notes.

anemia and other hematologic disorders. His clinic will be part of the Children's Oncology Group through Children's Hospital of New Orleans and will offer enrollment on cooperative cancer treatment protocols.

Obstetrics and gynecology subspecialties include:

Maj. (Dr.) Keri Baacke, maternal fetal medicine, provides inpatient and outpatient consultation services to include specialized ultrasound and management of high-risk pregnancies.

Maj. (Dr.) Chad Hamilton, gynecologic oncologist, provides inpatient and outpatient consultation treatment for the full spectrum of gynecologic malignancies to include ovarian, uterine, cervical, vaginal and vulvar cancers.

General Wyman noted, "This relationship between Keesler Medical Center and Memorial Hospital at Gulfport is a 'win for all.' Our medical center is one of approximately five Air Force medical facilities housing subspecialty physicians and services and serves as training platforms for multiple physician residencies."

"The win-win for the communities we serve is the expansion of children's services and the availability of maternal-fetal medicine. This partnership

will also increase access to Memorial's neonatal intensive care unit for premature infants. It's also important to recognize the support of Memorial's medical staff for these services," said Gary Marchand, Memorial Hospital president/CEO.

"This agreement with Memorial Hospital at Gulfport and the community expands our population base as well as provides us access to Memorial's facilities, including its neonatal intensive care unit, pediatric inpatient unit, hematology and oncology clinics and other inpatient services. This improves our ability to ensure the subspecialists maintain their currency and competency as we execute our health-care delivery mission at Keesler, within our community and across the globe," said General Wyman.

Col. Martha Stokes, director of the 81st MDG Graduate Medical Education program added, "These pediatric and ob/gyn physicians will significantly enhance the capability to care for patients within our medical community. In addition, since patients can be cared for locally, there will be less disruption to families who previously were required to travel an hour or more for similar subspecialty care."

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Keesler nurse striving for 'doctor' designation

KEESLER AIR FORCE BASE, Miss. — Soon nurse Juanita Mullins can be called "doctor."

Ms. Mullins, a clinical nurse with the 81st Surgical Operations Squadron post anesthesia care unit, is currently working on her doctorate in nursing practice at the University of South Alabama College of Nursing.

"I am in the first class to be admitted to the program. As part of the requirements, we have to complete a systems-change project for our residency. For my DNP project - 'Using Human Patient Simulation to Improve Emergency Airway Management Safety in Post Anesthesia Nursing: A Pilot Project' - I am devising a program that will use Keesler Medical Center's human patient simulators to augment the PACU/ Ambulatory Surgical Unit orientation, staff development and recurrent training. I am also training as a sim lab super-user because I will be here after others move due to permanent change of station orders."

Ms. Mullins started her class in August 2007 and will complete her DNP in May. Forty students are expected to be admitted each fall and the college expects to graduate 130 DNPs in the first five years of the program. Unlike a Ph.D. program in nursing, which prepares students for careers in research, the

DNP program places more emphasis on practice, the evaluation of health-care outcomes and the development of new programs of care.

"The DNP program prepares nurses to work in interdisciplinary teams, in new and emerging technology, with complex health-care problems and issues, and to be able to evaluate research and put the best evidence into practice," Ms. Mullins explained.

Ms. Mullins has been a Civil Service employee for 30 years. Before becoming a registered nurse, she was a U.S. Forest Service researcher. Her husband, Roland, is a registered pharmacist with the 81st Diagnostics and Therapeutics Squadron pharmacy Flight. He retired from the Veterans Affairs Gulf Coast Health Care System as director of pharmacy services. Their daughter, Jennifer, is an Air Force captain and judge advocate stationed at Davis-Monthan AFB, Ariz. Their son, Roland III, graduates from Florida State University in December with a master's degree in classics and teaches undergraduate-level Greek and Latin.

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

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

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
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
